COUNTRYSIDE OR CITY?

As part of our research for My Big Fat Cowpat Wedding we interviewed people in mixed marriages, from different ethnic cultures and from both urban and countryside environments. We asked them – Countryside or City? These are some of their responses.

CITY

- 66 Cities are full of life with a great buzz and lots people rushing about. It's where all the fun seems to be happening!
- 66 There's people everywhere so you might not ever see the same face twice.
- 66 Cities are multicultural and full of difference. I think you'd feel more accepted here.
- 66 It's like everything is on your doorstep in the city, like your family/friends, schools, jobs and supermarkets.
- 66 My Best Man didn't make it to the church on time. He didn't realise that driving 16 miles through London would take far longer than 16 miles in Shropshire! ??

COUNTRY

- 66 I remember, the first time I stayed overnight in the countryside. It's the strangest thing but the silence was deafening and I just couldn't sleep. Not until I put the radio on for background sound.
- 66 It's so green and beautiful here and I feel more relaxed. It's good to get back to nature sometimes.
- 66 First thing I noticed were those narrow country roads and no street lights - driving is so scary at night without lights. There's no pavements, so how do you know where to walk???
- 66 People in the country know everyone and talk to everyone. They help you out if they know you, but they spot an outsider straight away. ??
- 66 Some locals just turned up to my wedding at the Church without being invited! They'd heard there was a wedding on and stood in the road to wave good wishes. Would that happen in a city???
