
Singh Tangos

Singh Tangos


The seed of *Singh Tangos* came from a writing exercise in one of Kali's workshops. It's early life was very different to its current form. Mr Singh was originally a traffic warden who was regularly transported into a fantasy world by his multi-coloured turban. I may still write that story. Cassie then emerged as an angry turban-wearing teenager who kept a trunk full of chocolate under her bed and locked herself in her room, escaping secretly through her bedroom window to buy supplies from the local petrol station. Her parents couldn't understand why she was continuously putting on weight. Tej was being pursued by a trainee white witch, practising her spells on him in an attempt to capture his love. Maybe all of this will be in the sequel.

It's hard to explain how a story develops or to understand where it comes from. It's a magical process that I don't particularly wish to analyse. When a story is finished, (and, like a painting, it never really is) it just feels right, as if it has always existed somewhere in the ether for us to pluck. The proces of getting there is like peeling an onion, layer after layer, until reaching it's core, if you peel too far it vanishes.

The issues at the core of *Singh Tangos*; the business of fitting in, of finding an identity, of belonging to a community, are all a reflection of my core. Although the story, events and characters in the play are fictional, they mirror my family and the generational issues we as 'other' had to face. I did not follow Cassie's chosen path but her needs and desires for a 'traditional' life reflect a feeling of displacement that I and many second generation British Asians have experienced.

When working with comedy, some people miss the serious underlying issues being dealt with. I see comedy as power. The ability to laugh at ourselves and in the face of adversity is both a gift and a weapon. If you can take what's thrown at you and turn it into humour, it washes away the fear and the pain. You can use it to make sure the buggers don't get you down.
